Rabbi's Message: In the Shadow of a King

"Great men are almost always bad men," was an observation offered by the 19th-century English Catholic, Lord Acton. Perhaps we live in an era in which greatness is confounded with goodness. Fortunately, history has preserved the memory of great figures also blessed with goodness. Later this month, on Monday, January 16, 2017, the USA will observe a national holiday which enshrines the legacy of such a personage when we mark the birthday of the late Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The renowned civil rights icon will also be memorialized during 2017 on the 49th anniversary of his assassination on a Memphis hotel balcony in April of 1968. As the event itself recedes from the horizon of living recollection, it is crucial that the Jewish community in America remain dedicated to conserving Dr. King's legacy at an historical juncture when the decades-long struggle for universal voting rights may see its hard-won gains imperiled by a renewed wave of racial intolerance.

We in the Reform Jewish Movement may claim a special stake in the battle for racial justice because of the documented achievements of the Religious Action Center of the Union for Reform Judaism. It was the late Rabbi Maurice Eisendrath, erstwhile president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (the UAHC, predecessor of the URJ), who supervised the draft of the 1965 Voting Rights Act in the very offices of the RAC on Massachusetts Avenue in Washington, DC.

In view of alarming instances of voter suppression which targeted minorities in several states during the fall elections, the Reform Movement's leaders were vocal and active in working on behalf of voter protection. My colleagues in the Central Conference of American Rabbis travelled down to Georgia in the same spirit of the Freedom Riders and the volunteers who risked their lives to promote voter registration during Freedom Summer in the Deep South more than fifty years ago.

Living here in the North Country, very distant from the nation's capital and the centers of power, we in our small Jewish community may be limited in what we may contribute to the cause of human and civil rights, but that fact does not constrain us from accomplishing what we can realistically do for those suffering from systematic oppression. The violence protested by the Black Lives Matter movement, along with tropes of racism and xenophobia which marred the last election campaign, should inspire Jews to respond with renewed dedication to the hallowed cause of social justice.

Our local opportunity to respond to the prophetic call of Dr. King's "I have a dream" speech will come later this month when Temple Beth El hosts anew our annual Martin

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Luther King, Jr. / Abraham Joshua Heschel Shabbat with our partners at the Faith Tabernacle Baptist Church, pastored by Rev. Leonard Oates, on Friday, January 13, at 7:00 pm. As we have done on prior such observances, music and readings from the canon of the Civil Rights movement will be important features of the liturgy. Then two days later, on Sunday afternoon, the annual MLK Day March will take place from City Hall to Christ Church United Methodist, 54 Bay Street, for an observance. This latter event, which I attended for the first time last year, involves a significant presence from youth choirs from around the city.

As we join our neighbors and fellow Americans in honoring the great legacy of the civil rights icon, let us recall that we march in the shadow of the King.

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TEMPLE HISTORY

Milton Klein, Jaxton Manufacturing Corporation, and the Tree Of Life



The "Tree of Life" is an important symbol in Judaism, from its first mention in our Bible as a centerpiece of the Garden of Eden, to the end of the Torah service, where it is identified with the sacred Law itself. In many synagogues, a Tree of Life is erected as a piece of art, with leaves bearing the names of living family members of financial donors. Usually, the structures are purchased from national suppliers of synagogue goods. The Tree of Life in the Temple Beth El Home Room, however, was custom-designed by a member of our Congregation and custom-made in Glens Falls.

Born in Albany, New York, in 1910, Milton Klein bought a sawmill on Cooper Street in Glens Falls at the beginning of World War II. In 1950, with a partner, he started the Jaxton Manufacturing Corp. in the building. After a short time, Klein bought his partner's share of the business. Jaxton Manufacturing Corp. made hand-made, wooden serving pieces and giftware from walnut, ceramic, and other materials. The line included elaborate food-warmers, cheese boards, and carving sets, as well as battery-operated pendulum wall-clocks and other gifts. Milton Klein designed many of these items himself and received a number of patents. The items were sold in retail stores throughout the U.S. The "Georges Briard" line was sold in elite shops, including the flagship Neiman-Marcus store in Dallas, Texas, where some customers mistook the cheese trays for exclusive French imports. ("Georges Briard" was really Yasha Broido, a Jewish immigrant who worked for a Jaxton sub-contractor.) The business was extremely successful in the 1960's and 1970's, but Klein closed down the company in 1992, because walnut was becoming impossible to obtain, and the business could no longer compete with mass-produced imports. Klein died in 1999.

Milton Klein was an active member of Temple Beth El, generous with his time and money. He served as an officer and trustee of the Congregation and chaired the campaign that raised \$250,000 for a major addition to the Temple building in the mid-1960's. In his travels, he liked to visit other synagogues and saw a Tree of Life in a Reform temple. He decided to create and donate a Tree of Life as a fundraiser for Temple Beth El. Temple members were encouraged to honor their children and other loved ones with leaves that could be purchased with payments spread over as much as five years. Klein designed the Tree himself, and it was hand-made of walnut by his wife's brother, Al Elson. Klein's youngest child, now in his sixties, remembers helping to make the leaves.

In recent years, two Temple members adopted the Tree of Life as a project to ensure that it remains as relevant to our Congregation as it was at its installation. Martha Searleman has painstakingly cleaned the leaves and name-plates, arranged them to highlight families with an ongoing connection to Temple Beth El, and made an alphabetical list of the names. Artist Phyllis Brown created an illustration of the Tree of Life, with numbered sections. The list and the illustration hang near the Tree and provide a cross-reference so that visitors to the Temple Home Room can easily locate their own names and the names of relatives and friends.

A few leaves are still available on the Temple's Tree of Life. Now, it requires only a small contribution to honor a family member or friend with a personalized leaf on this living artifact of Temple Beth El.

Remember: If your article will be timed to coincide with a holiday or event, you will want it to appear at least as early as the issue preceding the event. And if you are asking for volunteers, for reservations, or for advance ticket or merchandise purchases, your article or announcement may need to appear several months in advance. Even for something that is several months away, it is never too early to submit an announcement to get the *Shofar* readers to "save the date"!

The Editors welcome letters and other reader contributions. E-mail submission (Office@GlensFallsTemple.com) is preferred. Submit your article as an e-mail message or as an attachment. If you lack internet access, you may deliver or mail your submission to the attention of Katie Weaver at Temple Beth El, 3 Marion Avenue, Glens Falls, NY 12801, timed to arrive prior to the deadline.

The deadline for getting articles to Katie for the February issue of the *Shofar* is Tuesday, January 17!
